**01. INTRODUCTION**

There were One Hundred and Twenty-Nine (129) Presbyters serving in the District within the period under review.

### **3.0 OVERARCHING GOALS**

#### **3.1 MEMBERSHIP STATISTICS:**

**DOG-01:** On the growth of membership, the District, during the year under review recorded an annual growth rate of **4.62%**, from a total of **6759** in 2024 to a total of **7071** in 2025.

There was, therefore, a numerical growth of 312 members in the District during the year under review. This was achieved through evangelism, continuous education and welfare support for our members.

#### **3.2 MEETING REPORTING DEADLINE**

**DOG-02 - 04:** The District met all the four (4) quarterly reporting requirements. The collation of congregational reports while drafting the district's own report has been humbling and thoughtful, assisting congregations and Preaching Point to respond to the reporting requirements.

### **4.0 COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES**

#### **4.1 ECUMENICAL AND SOCIAL RELATION**

##### **4.1.1 Key Performance Indicators**

- a. DESR -01: Public Interest Activities are organized.
- b. Objective - Improve upon the relationship between the church and the public institutions.
- c. Result - The District organized a training seminar on "The Role of the Church in Modern Social Issues (Addiction, Homelessness, Etc.) and how Ecumenical Co-Operation can strengthen these Efforts." (37 Participants)

##### **4.1.2 Key Performance Indicators**

- a. DESR- 02: Participate in Local Council of Churches (LCC) programs and activities of sister churches.
- b. Objective - Enhance collaboration and effective delivery of ministry among our Congregations and other Christians.
- c. Result - The District organized a training seminar on "How to form a Local Council of Churches" for the leadership of the congregations in the District and their respective ESR Committees. (14 Participants)

##### **4.1.3 Key Performance Indicators**

- a. DESR: Healthy relationships and ministry of other faiths are promoted.
- b. Objective - Improve upon members' understanding of interfaith issues.

- c. Results - A symposium was organised by the Dist. ESR on “How to peacefully co-exist with People of other Faith.” (28 participants)

#### 4.1.4 Key Performance Indicators

- a. DESR -04: Healthy relationship and ministry to the palace is promoted
- b. Objective: Improve upon the relationship between the Church and the Palace.
- c. Strategy: Establish and improve relationship between traditional leaders and the church.
- d. Results: In collaboration with the Dist. M&E Committee, a training programme was organised by the Dist. ESR. on “Engaging in effective palace ministry.” However, there was no visitation to the palace.

#### 4.1.5 Way Forward

I urge all congregations to encourage and resource their ESR committees to engage in the activities of the Local Council of Churches, engage with more inter-faith communities and ensure frequent interactions with the Muslim communities and palaces in the Abeka District.

## 4.2 EDUCATION

#### 4.2.1 Key Performance Indicators

- a. Meetings - Committee members have resolved to have virtual meetings periodically and meet at Abeka when the need arises.
- b. Objectives –
  - To strengthen local committees to be active and help establish a committee at every local.
  - To identify the challenges in the schools within the catchment area and help to solve these problems.
  - To visit the schools in the locals and interact with head teachers and teachers to address their concerns.
  - To assist members in the various locals in reading and speaking Ghanaian Language
  - To mentor the youth in the church.

#### 4.2.2 Planned Activities:

- Organize a refresher training workshop for the two schools.
- Design a comprehensive education policy document to guide and streamline Education related activities in the various locals in the district.
- Periodic visitation to the schools within the catchment area.
- Organize a Mock exam for the JHS final year students in Adom congregation to sharpen their Skill and enhance their preparedness for their final exams.
- Organize an interactive sensitization program based on new curriculum for BECE final year students in the district.
- To pay regular visit to the Presbyterian basic and any Senior High Schools within the

jurisdiction of the district.

- Organize District award scheme for the final year students based on their performance result during the WASSCE and BECE respectively.
- To observe Education week in all congregations.
- To attend Presbytery and District Committee on education meetings and give reports.

#### 4.2.3 Results:

- Almost all the members took part in our virtual discussions.
- The district will organize B.E.C.E sensitization and Subject interaction program for all final year learners of the Junior High Levels in the catchment area of the district on the 1st of May, 2025.
- There was some interactive mock exams for the final year students of Junior High Schools in the entire district on the 1st of May 2025.
- All congregations were encouraged to support needy and poor students' who are in the basic, second, third cycle schools, and pay those in schools a visit. Some locals were able to support our learners.
- New life preparatory school have managed to erect more classrooms for the primary section and there is another new building being constructed on the church land to pave way for their JHS.
- We paid a casual visit to the Niiboi Town Presbyterian Preparatory school on the 26th of February and on the 26th of February we were at New Life Presbyterian school. We do call the heads of the various schools when the need arises too.
- Through the districts, the Presbytery has collated the best three candidates' B E C E results in the various Presbyterian schools in the Presbytery for awards.
- The long awaited District Minister's Award came on as planned. On the 26th of January, 2025 the district was able to award three best B.E.C.E. candidates from three of our congregations. The candidates who were awarded were Master Agbeke Solomon Kobla Sarkodee from Bethel JY who had aggregate 6 with a Raw Score of 311 now at Presec Legon, Master Ruben Asante from Christ the King, who had aggregate 6 with a Raw Score of 295 now at Presec Legon and also Ms. Tenkorang Vanisa Afram who had aggregate 8 with a Raw Score of 302 now at Ghana National. The committee members are happy to see the commencement of the district minister's Award this year.
- The Presbytery is planned to award candidates who did very well in the 2025 BECE in the Presbyterian Schools, so the district has sent the names of the following candidates from Niiboi Town Presbyterian Preparatory school (private)- Fuseini Masturatu Issah who had Aggregate: 9 with the Raw score of 291 now at T.I. Ahmadiyya S.H.S. Kumasi doing General Science, Mensah Ernestina Adutwumwaa with Aggregate 10 and Raw score of 286 now at St. Mary's S.H.S. - Korle Gonno offering General Arts and Mawufemor Dogba with Aggregate 12, Raw score of 277 now at Wesley Grammar S.H.S. doing General Science to the Presbytery.
- There was a virtual meeting on the 8th of August 2025 at 9pm and majority joined the discussion which was about the organization of visitation of our learners in the secondary and tertiary institution. We have meanwhile resolved that the congregational Education committee will do the visitation and report to the district.
- The district committee has compile all the names of our learners and their schools to

the district standing committee.

- We are preparing for the District minister's award for the year 2025 candidates. Three learners will be awarded two from New Life and one from Charis.
- All locals celebrated the education week as planned on the almanac on the 6th October to 12th October, 2025. The theme for the year was celebrating our Heritage, Persisting in mission- The role of Leadership in our schools (1 Corinthias 15:58) . We are encouraging all congregations to send their remittances to the district, presbytery and National accordingly.

#### 4.2.4 Challenges

- We are pleading with committee members to try their possible best and join our online discussions when the need arises.
- Due to the work schedules of members, most of us could not make it for the visits to the schools and the school worships on Wednesdays. We pray that members could team up with some of our congregational group members to worship with our schools during their Wednesday school worship period in the coming years.

#### 4.2.5 Way Forward:

- Below are some of the projections of the Committee.
- Teachers for the various subjects within the schools in the district should also be awarded upon performance soon.
- We would also like to organize some activities that will promote the speaking and reading of Ghanaian languages (Ga & Twi) in our various locals. Some of the activities that pop up were Sunday school, bible reading class, literacy class etc.
- The committee on Non-formal Education members in the presbytery has been charged to plan for literacy training program/skill training for our districts.

### 4.3 ADMINISTRATION AND HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

#### 4.3.1 Key Performance Indicators

- a. Health Seminar - In an era marked by rapid societal change, economic uncertainty, and evolving ministry demands, the well-being and effectiveness of church leaders are more important than ever. Recognizing this, the Presbyterian Church of Ghana, Abeka District Committee on Administration and Human Resource management organized a Health Seminar on the topic: "Empower your well-being: Fuel your Life".
- b. Objective –
  - To renew and inspire church leaders and their families to thrive in their personal ministerial lives through Biblical principles, practical strategies and peer engagement.
  - To promote holistic wellness by addressing physical health, mental well-being, and emotional balance among ministers, catechists and staff.
  - To strengthen family life and spousal support, recognizing the vital role of stable, supportive family systems in effective ministry.
- c. Activities –
  - The AHRM Committee in consultation with the District Minister and Clerk scheduled the seminar for Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> July, 2025 at Royal Priesthood Congregation Abeka, at

5:30pm.

- An educational and informative flyer was designed and shared on various platforms to create awareness before the program date.
- Agents and staff were informed.
- The Resource person, Rev. Prof. Adukwei Hesse, a medical Doctor and a former minister of PCG was invited.
- The resource material was shared with Agents and staff after the program to serve as a regular guide.

d. Results –

- The Agents and Staff present had a very educative and insightful interaction with the resource person.
- Participants had the opportunity to ask questions about what to eat, how to eat and the appropriate time to eat.

e. Way Forward -

- Time for such educational programs should be re-considered to avoid low participation
- Subsequently, health screening should be added to the seminar
- To organize training programs for Agents and staff
- To assist and encourage various congregations to properly register their properties and acquire various permits

#### **4.4 DEVELOPMENT AND SOCIAL SERVICES**

##### 4.4.1 Key Result Area

a. Subject: Meetings

b. Objectives

- To plan activities.
- To source ways to effectively hold programs.

c. Activities:

- Committed Congregational chairpersons and members took active part
- Meetings were held via conference calls.

d. Results

- Committee members took active part.

##### 4.4.2 Key Result Area

a. Subject: Training Seminar On Entrepreneurship.

b. Objectives

- To train and educate participants on vegetable farming.
- To help individuals to start up small back yard farming within the district who may show interest.

c. Activities:

- Resource Person Was Contacted To Educate & Train Participants

d. Results:

- The training could not come off under the year reviewed due to the following:
- The availability by the district chair.
- Inability to hold series of meetings to establish our readiness.

4.4.3 Key Result Area

a. Subject: Health Walk Activities.

b. Objectives:

- To help members to engage in healthy exercise.
- To remind members of the benefits of a healthy walk.

c. Activity:

- The house came to an agreement that congregations should organize these health walks.

d. Result:

The following congregations reported on having screening sections and talks.

- New Life Congregation,
- Royal Priesthood Congregation
- Charis Congregation, and
- Adom Congregation.

**4.5 CHURCH LIFE AND NATURE**

4.5.1 Key Result Area

a. Children's Ministry

The children's Ministry undertook the following activities in the year under review, camp meeting children's day celebration, children's harvest, parent's day celebration, graduation and flower service. Children from all congregations within the district and their teachers participated in the activities.

b. Challenges Faced

- Lack of adequate teachers
- Lack of adequate spaces for class separations.
- Insufficient teaching aids for effective learning.

c. Recommendations

- Continuous appeal to congregational sessions to make conscious effort on creating spaces for the children's ministry.
- Strengthening child visitation and evangelism among the children.

d. Deliverance

Congregational sessions must constantly monitor the teacher-to-child relationship for effective learning.

#### 4.5.2 Key Result Area

##### a. Junior Youth Ministry

They undertook the following activities in 2025, Annual delegate's conference, bible quiz and youth worship service.

##### b. Challenges

- Inadequate finance to fund their programs and low attendance to leaders meeting and programs
- Lack of teaching aids and logistics like pews, instruments etc. to support their service.
- Inadequate youth leaders.
- Lack of visitation to schools (Second cycle)

##### c. Deliverance

- Train more youth to become leaders in the ministry.

#### 4.5.3 Key Result Area

##### a. Young People's Guild

Activities undertaken under the year in review include 'Light up, youth and students week celebration, health walk, revival, annual delegates' conference, evangelism outreach to Ashalaja (3rd October preaching point) and elections.

##### b. Challenges

- Late and poor attendance at district programs.
- Lack of zeal towards district programs by branch executives

##### c. Achievement

- Won the presbytery zonal Bible quiz.
- Donated PA systems, chairs, Bibles, Microphones and hymn books to the 3rd October preaching point.

##### d. Deliverance

- Provision of a laptop for the district secretary to enhance administrative work and conduct training on report writing for branch secretaries.

#### 4.5.4 Key Result Area

##### a. Young Adults Fellowship

The following activities were undertaken in 2025. Council Meetings, Police cells visitation, YAF Day with JY & Children's Service, Health walk, Revival (October to Remember), Maseda nie (Annual thanksgiving service), YAF week celebration, evangelism outreach to Ashalaja( preaching point) and annual delegates conference.

##### b. Challenges

- Lack of funds for the pavilion project completion

- Nonpayment of financial obligations by the branches to the district.
- c. Achievements
  - Two (2) of our YAF members have been elected at the Presbytery level for Presbytery YAF Secretary and Presbytery YAF Organizing Secretary.
  - The district has successfully built One (1) Pavilion for the West Akim Presbytery in the Eastern Region, yet to be commissioned.
  - The district has been able to purchase a laptop and printer for the secretarial office.
  - The district won best YAF group at the 2025 Ga- West presbytery awards.
- Donated tents and cash to the 3rd October preaching point.

#### 4.5.5 Key Result Area

##### a. Women's Ministry

The women's ministry organized the following programs in the year under review women's week celebration, council meetings, annual delegate's conference, training sessions, monthly prayer meetings, visitations and bible quiz.

##### b. Challenges

- Refusal of graduands from YAF to join the women's ministry.
- Financial constraints since majority of its members are the aged

##### c. Recommendations

- Restructure the activities of the ministry to engage more of its early-stage members (YAF graduates)
- Champion flagship programs that build women and children.
- Hold talks and programs with YAF members to whip up their interests in the ministry.

#### 4.5.6 Key Result Area

##### a. Men's Fellowship

In the year under review the following programs were undertaken, Council meetings, Bible quiz, men's week celebration, delegate's conference, donation and motors rider's rally.

##### b. Challenges

- Low attendance of meetings and financial constraints

##### c. Recommendation

- Restructure activities to engage more members.
- Organize and champion flagship programs that target men's growth and family building.
- Brainstorm effective ways to collect dues.
- Kwabena Boateng, the bible quiz contestant for 3years should be rewarded.

##### d. Achievement

- Won the 2nd position in the presbytery quiz.
- Donated 27 bags of cement to Ebenezer congregation.

#### 4.5.7 Key Result Area

a. Church Choir

In the year under review, the following activities were undertaken delegates conference, bible quiz, music festival, prayer retreat, marriage seminar, thanksgiving service (Maseda Nie)

b. Challenges

- Lack of funds to pay debts at presbytery level.
- Nonpayment of levies by local choirs.

4.5.8 Key Result Area

a. Singing Band Union

Anointing service, open air crusade, delegates conference, fund raising, singing practice are the activities that were undertaken in the year under review.

b. Challenges

- Non-adherence to union bye laws and some bands have challenged electing new officers.

c. Projection

- To increase membership by 10%.

d. Achievement

- Purchased some music instruments for the band.
- Seminar on Secretarial and Financial Report
- The district was 1st in the presbytery conference singing competition.
- The district was 4th in the presbytery bible quiz
- The district was able to settle all our debt due to the presbytery.

## 6.0 MAJOR CHALLENGES

**1. Reporting:** There are still challenges with the preparation of quarterly and annual reports by the clerks of congregations. There are often delays in the submission of reports, despite the training sessions organized for them. The district I.C will continue to advance training to the clerks and ICs at the congregational level.

**2 Event Center:** The committee has completed six (6) signage which are yet to be erected. The committee is yet to receive the funding from the Presbytery in order to put a few things in place for the center to become operational. That is tiling of the dais, painting works, horticultural works and repair works of some electrical fittings.

## 7.0 REMISSION AND INTERPRETATION OF CONSTITUTION

**7.1 Remission for a Thanksgiving Service Order:** That a formal liturgical order for thanksgiving services held by bereaved families on the Sunday following a burial should be developed by the Presbyterian Church of Ghana.

### **Justification**

It has been a long-standing and well-established practice within the Presbyterian Church of Ghana that when a member dies, the bereaved family returns to worship on the Sunday following the burial to render thanksgiving to God for the life of the deceased and for the successful funeral rites. This practice has become an important pastoral and liturgical moment in the life of our congregations. However, it is worth noting that, despite its prevalence over many years, the Church has not developed or approved a formal Order to guide this thanksgiving service. This represents a notable omission within our liturgical framework. We, the members of the Abeka District Session therefore wish to raise this matter as a remission to the Upper Court, respectfully requesting that urgent steps be taken to consider, develop, and approve an appropriate liturgical Order to guide congregations in this important aspect of our corporate life.

1. The Abeka District hereby seeks an official interpretation of Article 13 (5)(a)&(f) and Article 14(2)(a)& (e) from the appropriate church court regarding two distinct roles:

- i. Whether the District Minister, while chairing the District Session and/or the District Session Council concurrently serves as the Minister-in-Charge of the Head Station for representation purposes.

**Justification:** This clarification is necessary to ascertain whether there is equitable representation during votes. During deliberations at the District Session or District Session Council where voting is required to determine an issue, the District Minister may be compelled to abstain in order to maintain neutrality. In situations where the matter under consideration directly affects the Head Station, such abstention may place the Head Station at a disadvantage in terms of numerical representation. While all other congregations retain their full constitutional representation, the Head Station's representation would be reduced by one, owing to the abstention of the district minister who also serves as the Minister-in-Charge of the Head Station.

### **7.2 Deliverance**

The Abeka District is most grateful to the Good Lord for how far He has brought us. It is our prayer that He will grant the Ga West Presbytery peace to always propagate the gospel. We humbly request that this report be accepted.
