- g. Victory Congregation, Kwashiebu
- h. Glorious Preaching Point, Odorkor Station

### **1. Membership Statistics**

The membership of the Kaneshie District currently stands at 10,619, representing a growth rate of 4.42%. The membership is distributed as follows:

- **Children:** 2,016 (1.87%)
- **Junior Youth:** 1,257 (5.63%)
- **Youth:** 1,928 (6.11%)
- **Young Adults:** 1,758 (1.80%)
- **Adults:** 3,660 (5.87%)

From a physical inspection of AR-2 table, please refer for more detailed information, Children up to 12 years and Young Adults (30-40) years recorded less than 2% growth. Junior Youth, Youth and Adults population increased more than 5% over figures recorded in 2024. Junior Youth, Youth and adults membership of the church grew more than 5% over the figures recorded in 2024.

### **2. Meeting Reporting Deadlines**

The District successfully met all reporting deadlines during the reporting period. However, challenges arose due to some congregations failing to submit their reports in the correct format and on time. To address this issue, the District undertake intermittent training and will continue to undertake this training for our Congregational Clerks and Implementation Coordinators (ICs) to improve the timeliness and accuracy of report submissions.

The Kaneshie District employed diverse strategies to achieve its evangelistic targets. These included intentional evangelism focused on children and teens, aimed at addressing the challenge of an aging district. Specific activities included crusades, film show evangelism, house-to-house visits, and one-on-one evangelism.

Additionally, the District supported the Paanor Preaching Point throughout the year. All congregations within the District visited the preaching point at least once, following a visitation schedule.

The District M&E had quarterly crusades to strengthen them and also undertake house to house evangelism with them. The district through was able to help Paanor won 33 souls and also raised GHS15,000.00 to support their building roofing project

The District remains committed to achieving the KPIs under mission and evangelism by intentional undertaking the following in year 2026:

1. Work towards planting a new preaching point at Fise district as designated by the Presbytery.
2. We shall continue to offer mission support for the Paanor church.
3. Arrange quarterly visits to cells/prisons / Hospitals

4. Launch operation 'win a soul in 2026 for Christ Church'.
5. Organize two Prayer meetings as a district in both the 1st half, and the 2nd halves of the year 2026.
6. Ensure Asempatrew (church extension) is effectively organized.

The DAHRM was able to hold trainings for staff of the district and congregations as well as agents on understanding the complexities of workplace culture and being a kingdom builder through our work.

DAHRM have identified lapses and delays in our reporting standards, both narratives and statistics as congregations and as groups. Some groups executives' sessions members need training to fully understand our strategic report and what they can add for collective achievement of the KPIs.

To address this, the DAHRM intends to strengthen and support AHRM efforts at the congregational and district level to:

1. Organize Seminar on Digital Literacy for Agents and Administrators for effective internal and external evangelism.
2. Collaborate with Finance to organize a one-day training course for all Agents, Administrators, Account Officers /Treasurers/Financial Secretaries as well as Senior Presbyters, Clerks and groups presidents and secretaries, Treasurers and Financial Secretaries.

3. Organize one day training for all Agents, Clerks, Group Presidents, Secretaries, Congregational ICs, and Church Administrators on understanding the KPIs and data handling in line with the strategic plan of the PCG.

The district shall also team up with the Mt. Zion Congregation on the effort being done on the land that host Glorious Preaching Post at Odorkor main station.

The District had some marginal growth in church attendance, increasing by 3.2%. However, this fell significantly short of the targeted attendance growth of 5.8%. Group meeting attendance also failed to meet expectations, with a growth of 3.2% against the 20% target.

The District's generational and interest groups are not as vibrant as they used to be. Efforts are currently underway to revitalize the District Brigade, which is now in the process of being formed. To achieve key KPIs, the district is looking forward to undertake the following in 2026:

1. Liaise with AHRM/ DSS to organize counseling sessions and talks on pre-marital and post-marriage talks, e.g., a day marriage retreat or pre-marital talk.
2. Possibility of having a retreat for the aged and the widows/widowers within the district.
3. Ensure all district groups attend all programs organized by the district
4. Ensure that all group conferences and anniversaries are properly celebrated
5. Liaise with DSS, AHRM, and CLAN to organize a seminar on

- a. career guide and counselling for the Youth,
- b. Pre-Marriage Seminar for the unmarried, and
- c. Post-Marriage Seminar for the married

Congregations such as Kaneshie and Emmanuel have demonstrated commendable commitment by actively participating in the worship services of their schools. Similarly, Advent Congregation have made significant efforts, despite not having a school of its own.

In 2026, all congregations would be encouraged to adopt a school—whether private or public—within their community and actively engage in their worship services. These services should be designed to nurture students into mature Christians and serve as a strategic tool for evangelism.

Many congregations have made notable strides in visiting their Senior High School (SHS) and tertiary students, and we commend them for their dedication. To further enhance this effort, each congregation is encouraged to create a comprehensive database of all SHS and tertiary students. This database should include details such as names, schools, programs of study, and career aspirations. Such information will enable congregations to provide targeted pastoral care and support for the students.

Going into 2026, we plan to undertake the following;

1. Strategic move to visit our students in SHS and the Universities, and other colleges.

2. Liaise with the District Men's and Women's, YAF, etc, for NUPSG activities at Accra Academy and Accra Wesley Girls within each quarter of 2026.

3. Encourage Congregations to offer scholarship support to the members.

All congregations actively participated in educating members on various health issues during the Health Week celebrations, promoting healthier lifestyles within the church.

Despite these achievements, the DSS faced challenges in mobilizing committee members to participate actively in its activities. Moving forward, the District plans to intensify efforts under the DSS, encourage congregations to establish strong welfare schemes, and enhance support for the needs of their church members.

Congregations actively took part in the Christmas Street Party.

These initiatives are aimed at fostering holistic well-being among members while strengthening the church's social impact.

Going into 2026, we trust to undertake the following:

1. Team up with M&E and ESR to organize a cleaning exercise at Kaneshie market area or Odorkor Lorry Station or Darkuman circle station area while evangelizing Christ to all. Include or invite our traditional and Muslim brothers within the community to join us during the clean-up exercises.
2. Support for Kaneshie Disability Home; worship with them and occasionally transport them to worship with us at Kaneshie Congregation or one of our other local churches on a quarterly or monthly basis.

3. Ensure and report on Jesus Street party in the month of December and the district shall celebrate with one of our congregations so we can feed a good number of people

While there was an increase in absolute expenditure on Missions, Evangelism, Welfare, Education, and Scholarships, the percentage of total expenditure allocated to these areas fell below the target. To address this, the Committee on Finance has outlined the following measures:

The Committee will review and realign budgeting processes to ensure that the percentage of expenditure on strategic areas meets set targets.

Going forward, we would under seek:

1. Advise and see to the establishment of one- or two-income generation ventures for the district. Eg – Poultry farm, Fish Farming or even Cassava Plantation as a joint venture with any interest group/institution or a congregation
2. Undertake quarterly internal audit for all congregations and district groups
3. Collaborate with AHRM as per the training on good book keeping and others related to accounts and Finance

## MAJOR CHALLENGES

### 1. **Low participation among committee members, both at the congregational and district levels.**

Committees play a vital role in the church's governance, administration, and execution of its mission. When members are inactive or disengaged, it hampers progress and reduces the church's capacity to achieve its goals.

Committees struggle to make timely and informed decisions due to absenteeism or lack of commitment. Inactive members diminish the effectiveness of committees, leading to a backlog of tasks and unfulfilled objectives. A few committed members often bear the brunt of responsibilities, leading to burnout and reduced efficiency over time.

#### **Recommendations:**

- **Engagement and Training:** Organize workshops and seminars to educate members on the importance of their roles and responsibilities.
- **Recognition and Motivation:** Establish recognition programs to appreciate and reward active committee members.
- **Improved Communication:** Enhance communication channels to keep members informed and involved in committee activities.
- **Regular Reviews:** Conduct periodic reviews to address issues affecting participation and ensure accountability.

### 2. **The church's financial resources are often inadequate to meet the demands of its Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) outlined in the strategic plan.**

This financial shortfall limits the church's ability to execute programs and initiatives effectively.

Inadequate funding leads to delays in executing projects such as missions, welfare programs, and infrastructure development.

Limited finances often result in cutting corners, which can affect the quality and impact of church initiatives. The inability to fund certain activities leads to missed opportunities for growth and outreach.

#### **Recommendations:**

- **Enhanced Fundraising Efforts:** Develop innovative and sustainable fundraising initiatives, such as crowdfunding, benefit events, and partnerships with stakeholders.

- **Encourage Giving:** Foster a culture of consistent and sacrificial giving among members through stewardship education.
- **Prioritize Expenditure:** Reassess and prioritize spending to focus on high-impact areas that align with the strategic plan.
- **Financial Transparency:** Provide regular updates on church finances to build trust and encourage increased contributions from members.
- **Purchase of a Franchise:** The District Finance Committee shall study and advice on the profitability of purchasing franchise from Salem water.

**4. 36<sup>TH</sup> DISTRICT SESSION (2025)**

The District held its Session from 17<sup>th</sup> to 19<sup>th</sup> January, 2025. It was beautifully organized, was successfully hosted by Emmanuel Congregation, North Darkuman. At the end of the Session, the following decisions were taken:

- I. That all Congregations should comply with Article 9 cluase25 of the PCG Constitution, that mandate all Congregations to make available audited accounts by an external auditor to the District Session within three (3) months after the end of each physical year.

- II. That only Faith Congregation, Glorious Preaching Point and District Groups should have their accounts permitted to be audited by the District Internal Audit Team.
- III. That CLAN is to assist Faith Congregation, Odorkor Official Town to address their non-communicants' issues and address them.
- IV. That the Agents and Officers Welfare Policy was ratified.
- V. That the 2023 Audited Financial Statements of the District were accepted.
- VI. That the Provisional Budget was approved.
- VII. That the host for the 37th District Session is Victory Congregation, Kwashie-Bu was accepted.

## **5. NEW INITIATIVES BY KANESHIE CONGREGATION**

The largest congregation in the district, the Kaneshie Congregation, as part of the church's ongoing efforts to grow its ministry and strengthen fellowship, have launched a dynamic online ministry. This was made possible through a newly established media studio. The platform hosts weekly broadcasts featuring in-depth biblical teachings, followed by engaging conversations and live audience participation through calls, texts, and social media. It's a creative step toward reaching members across all age groups and walks of life, making the Word of God more accessible than ever.

Also, the head station have instituted a monthly prayer gathering called "Family Time at the Altar." Held on the last day of each month, this sacred session brings families together to lift prayer, seek God's guidance, and stand united in faith as they intercede for their homes and loved ones

It is important to state that have relocated their church services to the Akuffo Hall of the church to make room for the ongoing renovation which was started on 5<sup>th</sup> January, 2025. Thus, the District head station is unable to host usual Presbytery and National programs which would involve large audiences or attendees until the renovation is over. It is estimated to be completed by end of June, 2025.

## **6. LAUNCH OF BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION**

On Palm Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> March, 2024 the District made sure all our congregations approached the Presbytery office building fund raising with a unique strategy. We introduced an "Exchange of Pulpit".

The District directed ministers preach and help raised funds in other congregations other than their own congregations. On the whole, and as at the period of reporting, the District have paid GHS60, 744.30 and US\$600. The district will continue to remind members of our congregations who made pledges and would pay to the Presbytery as soon as they are redeemed.

The District have again circulated to all our congregations the receipts books for which adult members of our congregations are to pay a levy of 50 cedis towards the Presbytery Office building complex.

## **7. MISSION TO PAANOR**

The district M&E through the district evangelist, Cat. Emmanuel Ainooson held a three-day crusade at Paanor to help strengthen the prayer life and growth of the preaching point from 19<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> March. It was climax on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of March 2025 with a thanksgiving service to pray for the 36 souls that were won for Christ Jesus. Thirteen thousand cedis (GHS15,000.00) was raised to support the infrastructure development of the young church.

## **8. INDUCTION SERVICES**

The district under the leadership of Rev. Dr. G.O. Kwapong have had induction services for two of our ministers who joined the District in 2024.

Rev. Nii Amon Ashie, Minister-in-charge of Emmanuel Congregation, had his Induction on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> February, 2025. The colorful ceremony was officiated by the District Minister, Rev. Dr. G. O. Kwapong; the service was led by the District Clerk, Mr. James Preko Peprah and had the District Lay Rep, Mr. Bismark Korboe and four (4) other congregational Ministers in attendance.

Induction service for Rev. Wilson Awere Gyebi, Minister-in-charge of Victory Congregation, Kwashiebu was successfully held on Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> March, 2025. Rev. Darlington Yamoah of Darkuman Christ was trusted with the duty to perform the act of induction on behalf of the district minister. The District Clerk was the service leader. The District Lay rep., Mr. Bismark Korboe, council members and other agents were in attendance to witness and grease the occasion.

## **9. DISTRICT ALL - NIGHT**

On Friday 21<sup>st</sup> March, 2025, the district held all-night at the Mt. Zion congregation. This was the first time in the year 2025 that all

members from all our congregation worshipped and prayed together for the church, country and congregants. The prayer sessions were led by our own ministers.

#### **10. TRAINING FOR CHURCH STAFF**

The AHRM held a day's training on Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> February 2025 for staff and agents of our congregations on the following topics:

- I. Understanding the complexities of workplace culture – know your church. The objective was to enhance appreciation of the significance of culture and influence in church work.
- II. Being a kingdom builder through your work. The objective was to help build the capacity of church staff and agents for growth inbounds and leaps.

It was facilitated by Mr. S.N Tenkorang who doubles as the district AHRM committee chair. Attendance was thirty-three (33).

#### **11. A Key need of the Ghana Socially Disadvantage School at Kaneshie**

Through the district Development and Social Services (DSS), the district has been able to hand over 12 student's dining tables with chairs to match to the home upon a visit that was made to them. The dining room was also put into more useable facility for them. They were commissioned by the District Minister, Rev. G.O Kwapong on Friday 14<sup>th</sup> March 2025 to the glory of God. DSS committee chairperson, the District Clerk, Rev. Wilson Akakpo and Rev. Asamoah of Kaneshie as well as Cat. Samuel Ainooson and Rev. Dan-Francis Torgbor Annan were present during the commissioning. DSS members of the district were also present.

#### **12. Commissioning into the Ordained Ministry of PCG**

One of our members was commissioned as a minister on 1st June at a ceremony at Asofan Congregation; he is now known as Rev. Bernard Okyere Koomson, from the Emmanuel Congregation, North Darkuman.

One of our members, Mr. Osborn Saka of Odorkor Mt. Zion successfully gained Trinity seminary, and being trained as a minister for the Church of Christ.

#### **13. District Church Extension (Asempatrew 2025)**

This year's Church extension was successfully celebrated on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> December, 2025 through Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> December, 2025. There was open air crusade on the Wednesday through to Friday, where we were able to sell Christ

to people within the crusade ground and people we were passing by in their vehicles.

As part of the asempatrew, the team again embark on house to house on the Saturday 20<sup>th</sup> December, 20205. A follow up was made in the morning of Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> December before the thanksgiving service at Faith congregation.

In all we were able to reached out to 36 people. 12 people out of the 36, accepted to join our church though the host congregation. However, during the thanksgiving service three out of the 12 were present. Distrct minister prayed for them dbefore handing to the Senior Presbyter and the Catechist.

#### **14. Completion of Kaneshie Congregation Chapel Renovation**

To the grace of God, Kaneshie Congregation have successfully completed the refurbishment of the main chapel and have moved in. The rededication took place on Sunday, 14<sup>th</sup> December, 2025. It was performed by the Chairperson of the Presbytery, Rev. Eouch Pobee, supported by the Clerk, Rev. Kennedy Asante and the District Minister, Rev. Enock Kofi Obuobi. Rev. Dr. George Opare Kwapong who started the projected was also present.

#### **15. Provision of security Cameras**

Emmanuel Congregation and Victory Congregation have managed to install CCTV cameras in the school and church respectively, just as Kaneshie, the head station.

In addition, Emmanuel have completed a sick bay project with needed equipment and suppliers to offer proper first aid for the members during church service and any other church programmes.
