**PREAMBLE**

**1. INTRODUCTION:**

This report covers the activities of the New Achimota District for the period 1<sup>st</sup> January to 31<sup>st</sup> December 2025. The report focuses on the Strategic Goals, Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) and the extent to which they were met, some strategies and way forward. It also touches on some notable events and challenges during the period under review.

**2. ORGANIZATION AND STAFFING:**

**2.1 ORGANIZATIONAL DATA:**

There were twelve (12) Congregations and Preaching Points in the District within the period under review. These were made up of ten (10) Congregations and two (2) Preaching Points. A list of the Congregations and Preaching Points is thus, shown below:

### 2.2.3 Presbyters

There were One Hundred and thirteen (113) Presbyters serving in the District within the period under review.

## 3. AGENTS SERVING IN THE DISTRICT

### (i) Ministers

There were seven (7) Ministers who served in the District during the period under review. Out of this number, there were six (6) full-time Ordained Ministers and one (1) Ordained Tent-Ministers. Out the total of seven (7) Ministers, six (6) were male and one (1) was female.

### (ii) Catechists

There were ten (10) trained Catechists serving in the District. Out of this number, six (6) were male and four (4) were female. Within the period under review, two (2) additional persons namely: brothers Eric Ansah Addo and Victor Papafio of the Living Bread and Calvary Congregations respectively were trained as Catechists. They are yet to be consecrated.

### (iii) Caretakers

The District also had one (1) male Caretaker.

## 4. OVERARCHING GOALS:

### 4.1 MEMBERSHIP STATISTICS:

**DOG-01:** On growth of membership, the District, during the year under review recorded an overall growth of 3.18% approx..3.2% from a total of 6,600 in 2024 to a total of 6,810 at the end of 2025 against a 2025 set target of 7,260.

There was therefore a numerical grow of 210 ie. (6,810 -6,600) in the membership of the District. This was achieved through evangelism (though not much could be done),

continuous educational and welfare support for members though the target was not met. We hope to intensify our efforts in these areas to meet subsequent targets.

### **MEETING REPORTING DEADLINES:**

**DOG-02 - OG-05:** To a large extent, the District met her statutory reporting deadlines though there were a few delay. It was also able to submit all 4 quarterly narrative and Strategic Plan reports in addition to the 2025 Strategic Plan (TYRP). The persistent pursuing of Congregations and Preaching Points for their reports was a major challenge in the meeting of all timelines of the District. The District will, however, continue with her education and encouragement of the Congregations and Preaching Points to correct the anomaly.

**DOG-06:** The appraisal and Performance Targets have been done for Agents. Those for Committee Chairpersons and Staff are yet to be done.

## **5. DEPARTMENTAL GOALS:**

### **5.1 COMMITTEE ON MISSION & EVANGELISM**

#### **a) Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) and the extent to which they were met:**

- **DME-01:** The District won 740 souls representing 11.2% which exceeded our 2024 performance of 416 (6.6%). That notwithstanding, our target of 1,321 could not be achieved.
- **DME-01B:** Discipleship classes is organized for new converts and members: 92 out of a target of 134 was achieved.
- **DME-02:** It was the plan to undertake 34 mission activities in the course of the year, however, 29 mission activities were undertaken to the glory of God.
- **DME-02B:** The District exceeded her target of ministering to 33 Police Cell inmates with an actual of 85.
- **DME-03:** The District has planted one (1) new Preaching Point since 2024 therefore meeting her target of one(1).
- **DME-04:** The District has not inaugurated any Preaching Point to a Congregational status since 2024.

#### **b) Strategies:**

These achievements resulted mainly from evangelism such as street evangelism, house-to-house, market evangelism, sowers outreach, film show, dawn broadcasting, visitation and phone calls on new members, cell meetings. Bethel Congregation declared the month of April an evangelism month where members embarked on evangelism activities on Sundays with June as a prayer month. The Salvation Congregation also declared March as a prayer month and also strategized through the M&E Committee and undertook Sunday morning evangelism outreaches within the Community. These were done during the 1<sup>st</sup> services. Most Congregations in the district also held visitations to their members, street evangelism

The mother District, spearheaded by her Mission and Evangelism committee, undertook her usual Police Cells visitation where inmates were reached out to with the Salvation message of Christ, prayer and cooked food with water. The District, led by the Mission and Evangelism Committee, held her usual visitation to Police Cells 26<sup>th</sup> April, 2025. The Taifa Police Station with a total of 9 inmates and 2 officers, the Kwabenya station with 3 inmates with 12 officers and Pokuase Police Stations with 5 inmates with 5 officers were visited with the word of God, cooked food and water. On 9<sup>th</sup> August, 2025 also, the Mile 7 and Tesano Police Stations were visited. Forty-six (46) inmates and five (5) officers were reached out to with the Salvation message, cooked food, water and prayers. The Team prayed with the inmates as they gave their lives to Christ. In all, 87 persons made up of 63 inmates and 24 officers were ministered to.

**c) Way Forward:**

- The District will intensify her efforts in evangelism to win more souls for Christ.

**5.2 ADMINISTRATION & HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT**

**a) Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) and the extent to which they were met:**

- **DAHRM-01:** On regular training of Agents, 33 person.day out of a target of 38 person.day training of Agents was achieved.
- **DAHRM-01B:** It was the target of the District to have 38 Agents and their spouses medically screened annually. However, some could not partake in the exercise. This was because some had the opportunity of benefiting from such screenings before the Presbytery exercise.
- **DAHRM-02:** 23 out of 24 person.day training of Staff of the Congregations took place in year. There was no staff trainings within the period under review.
- **DAHRM-03:** The membership Form D updated through ERP could not be done due to the National challenges with the ERP Software.
- **DAHRM-04:** Membership data uploaded on ERP still stands at 2,815 due to the Challenge.

**b) Strategies:**

The District held an in-person training on the Revised P.C.G. Strategic Plan Excel Template for Congregational Clerks and Implementation Coordinators (ICs) on Friday 19<sup>th</sup> December, 2025. The District intends to have further engagements on the subject in 2026 and will include Agents, Committee Chairpersons as well as the Clerks and ICs.

Additionally, some Agents, Clerks, ICs and Chairpersons were able to join the Presbytery's virtual training on the subject on Wed. 17<sup>th</sup> December, 2025. Trainings for staff of District will be done in the ensuing year.

**c) Way Forward:**

By way of addressing the challenges with the ERP, the District, after taking part in the pilot training organized by the upper court (in the previous year-2024) awaits the next action on this after which the software will continue to operate to help the District and Congregations to upload the Form D and Cs to meet the targeted entries for the membership data respectively.

### **5.3 PROPERTY DEVELOPMENT, BUILDING AND PROPERTIES**

#### **a) Key Performance Indicators and the extent to which they were met:**

- **DAHRM-05:** Out of a target of 13 lands set to acquire Land Title Certificates, 10 lands.

The District had a total of 17 lands, therefore, 58.8% of the lands have the certificates.

- **DAHRM-06:** A total of 5 landed properties in the District had been insured as at the end of 2025 as against a set target of 7. There were 20 landed properties in the District, therefore, 25% had been insured and through TIB at the end of year 2025.
- **DAHRM-07:** Since 2024, one (1) land had been acquired for Preaching Point.
- **DAHRM-08:** Since 2024 also, there has not been any construction of chapels for Preaching Points.

#### **b) Strategies:**

The District. In her 2024 annual report to the Presbytery mentioned that she will also work hard to acquire land for the Preaching Points in subsequent years. This was done for Kofi Donkor Preaching Point which was allocated by the Presbytery to the District for nurturing and supporting. To God be the glory.

The District encouraged Congregations and Preaching Points to register their lands and insure their landed properties.

#### **c) Way Forward:**

The District will continue to encourage its Congregations and Preaching Points to acquire land Title Certificates, to insure all their lands and as much as possible do so through TIB.

### **5.4 ECUMENICAL AND SOCIAL RELATIONS**

#### **a) Key Performance Indicators and extent to which they were met:**

- **DESR-01:** 24 public interest activities were organized within the District with 281 members participating. The target of 30 activities with 1,199 participants was thus not reached.

- **DESR-02:** The District had 9 participations in the Local Council of Churches programs with 140 members out of a target of 11 and 276 respectively by the Congregations and Preaching Points.

- **DESR-03:** In promoting healthy relationship and ministry to people of other faith, 20. 5 inter-faith activities were held with 248 members out of the 24 activities with 344 participating members planned.

- **DESR-04:** 18 visitations to the palace were held by the Congregations in the District out of a set target of 22. Participants were 226 out of the 301 targeted.

**b) Strategies:**

There were clean up exercises organized by some congregations in the District as part of Public Interest activities. Some Congregations in the District visited the Palace and made donations in cash as well as part of efforts to promoting healthy relationship and ministry to the Palace. The mother District through the ESR Committee paid a visit to the Chief of Tantra Hills during the year as on Wednesday August 13, 2025. The gathering served as a platform not only for prayer but also a means for educating them on the importance of advocacy towards Peace, Divine protection and Economic development as a community. The district used the privilege to share the word with members of the Palace and encourage them not just vigilant but also embrace a common goal during their Homowo celebration.

**c) Way Forward:**

The District will continue with the organization of public interest activities, Local Council of Churches programs, as well as promoting inter-faith activities and a healthy relationship and Ministry to the Palace.

## **5.5 DEVELOPMENT AND SOCIAL SERVICES**

**a) Key Performance Indicators and extent to which they were met:**

- **DDSS-01:** The District had 32 activities on healthy living, sanitation and care for the environment with 418 members participating out of a targeted 35 activities and 970 participants.

- **DDSS-02:** The District achieved 20 in the area of livelihood development and integration of persons with disability. The target of 27 was thus, not met.

- **DDSS-03:** 14 entrepreneurial activities were carried out within the District with 40 members participating. Same number of activities was targeted with 370 members expected to participate.

- **DDSS-03B:** Christmas / Jesus Street Party was organized in the various Congregations and Preaching Points in the District. A total of 847 out of a target of 1,390 persons were fed with the word of God and physical food, drinks and water. It is our hope that these lives will be positively affected with the gospel and kind

gesture shared. Some shared appropriately used clothing and footwear properly demonstrated via 'Jesus Boutique'

- **DDSS-04:** 108 persons were supported with their welfare needs during funerals, marriages, naming ceremonies, visitation among others with a total amount of GHc126,035.00 against a target of 738 person and GHc71,649.50.
- **DDSS-05:** 22 indigents and extremely distressed members were supported with an amount of GHc11,100. The set target of 3,048 and GHc12,500 was thus not achieved.
- **DDSS-06:** 25 needy members were offered livelihood support with an amount of GHc9,200.00 as against 34 and GHc10,500.00 respectively targeted.

#### **b) Strategies:**

Some activities done include health talks. There were support for marriages, funerals, naming ceremonies, baptism of members and other welfare activities such as visitation of members by Agents and Presbyters where prayer, donations and encouragements were given to members. There were 'welfare fund' / 'needy fund' as some Congregations term them through which the Congregations generated financial support to help needy members of the Congregations.

#### **c) Way Forward:**

The District will continue with its welfare support, healthy living and livelihood support for persons with disability and also strategize on areas that targets were not met ie. supporting indigents and extremely distressed members as well as needy members in order to achieve its set target in subsequent years.

### **5.6 FINANCE**

#### **a) Key Performance Indicators and extent to which they were met:**

- **DFIN-01:** The Annual Audited Accounts was duly submitted.
- **DFIN-02:** The District spent GHc760,311.30 representing 15.6% of her total Expenditure excluding 50:50 contribution which was GHc4,879,873.10 on Missions Evangelism, Welfare, Education and Scholarship (the focus for the achievement of the Agenda 2M of the Church) as against a set target of GHc782,477.02 being 15.6% of a total expenditure of GHc5,216,513.47. Additionally, the District did better as compared to the previous year (2024) where 14.3% was spent. These percentages increments, though marginal, reflect some growth in this area, hence depicting an increased focus of the District towards meeting the Agenda of the Church.
- **DFIN-03:** The District also met the compliance with financial regulations of the Church, like payment of weekly contributions, statutory payments, audits, and the like.
- **DFIN-03B:** The District together with the Congregations and Preaching Points supported the Kutunse Project with GHc101,745.20 thereby exceeding our target of

GHc100,000.00. It is worth-mentioning that the major part of the remissions was generated through the Exchange of Pulpit program held on 26<sup>th</sup> October, 2025.

**b) Strategies:**

Congregations and Preaching Points within the District were constantly reminded of the fulfilment of their financial obligations. Though we achieve a higher percentage compared to the targeted percentage, the District will continue to encourage the Congregations and Preaching Points to continue to pay attention to the welfare of their members.

## **5.7 EDUCATION AND SCHORLARSHIP**

### **5.7.1 EDUCATION**

**a) Key Performance Indicators:**

- **EDU-01:** 196 candidates who obtained aggregate 36 or better in the B.E.C.E in public basic school were supported by the Church as against a target of 620. This represents a -47.3% growth over the previous year.
- **EDU-02:** The District had a set target of 53 but could hold 41 worship sessions in basic schools.
- **EDU-03:** Actual number of persons who participated in the speaking and reading of The Ghanaian language was 77 against a set target of 67.
- **EDU-04:** 22 activities were held with the NUPS-G of Senior High schools nearby with a total of 57 participants out of 20 activities and 156 participants planned.

**b) Strategies:**

The District therefore, exceeded her targets Edu-04 and 05 targets. There were visitations to the school for their worship services with prayer sessions. These were the back of increased commitments to the educational needs of members. Some Congregations paid visits to their members in school, presented items such as provisions and some educational materials to them and as well prayed with them. The members could not hide their joy in seeing their leaders visit them and have quality time with them.

**c) Way Forward:**

The District will further strategize and intensify its visitations to the SHS and Tertiary Institutions.

### **5.7.2 SCHOLARSHIP**

**a) Key Performance Indicators:**

- **EDU-05:** 80 members in SHS and Tertiary Institutions were visited within the period out of target of 36.
- **EDU-06:** The District also exceeded her target of 122 set for number of young members mentored with 142 achieved. Thus represents a -1.4% year on year growth (since that for 2024 was 144).
- **EDU-07:** 13 out of a target of 29 poor and needy students, representing 8.3% were

provided with scholarships.

**b) Strategies:**

The Congregations and Preaching Points were able to support with full and partial payments of school fees to deserving students with consideration to their inputs in the Church.

**c) Way forward:**

The District will continue with its visitations to SHS and Tertiary Students and mentorship program to maintain the rise above the targets and also support more needy students to meet its target in subsequent years.

## **5.8 CHURCH LIFE & NURTURE**

**a) Key Performance Indicators and extent to which they were met:**

- **CLN-01:** An average of 2,332 attendance representing -2.6% was achieved across the age groupings of members over the period out of a target of 2,580 which represents a year on year growth of 7.7%
- **CLN-02:** Out of the target of 544 average attendance to group meetings, 561 was achieved with a year on year growth of 6.5%.
- **CLN-03:** A total of 292 members participated in varied soul-winning activities. The set target of 220, was thus, exceeded.
- **CLN-03B:** 17 Bible Clubs with an average attendance of 78 children and Junior Youth were done against targets of 27 and 188 respectively.
- **CLN-04:** 92 person. day training was achieved for Presbyters, Committee members and group executive being regularly trained against a target of 55.

**b) Strategies:**

Congregations and Preaching Points are gradually paying attention to the generally reducing attendance of members to Church services and group meetings. This therefore, resulted in the improved averages for group meetings though attendance to Church services dropped slightly. The District encouraged Congregations and Preaching Points to make their meetings attractive as a way of addressing the initial challenge of poor attendance to group meetings. Some level of improvements have been achieved with the gradual rising of the year on year growth rate ie. from a 5.8% in 2024 to 6.5% in 2025. This drive will be intensified to further increase the attendances.

**c) Way Forward:**

With the believe that chapel are a means of evangelism, some Congregations (such as Salvation, Bethel, Nazareth, Hope, Living Bread) are currently undertaking some major refurbishments of their chapels. We pray and look forward to their positive impacts on church attendance and ultimately soul winning in the ensuing years.

The District will, strategize through its CLAN to have more trainings for Presbyters and group executive members

## 5.9 COUNSELLING & FAMILY LIFE

### a) Key Performance Indicators and the extent to which they were met:

- **CLN-05:** There were 47 guidance and counselling programs for identifiable interest groups and needs within the District out of a target 38. In all, 359 members participated in the programs as against 348 members targeted.
- **CLN-06:** The District exceeded her target of 348 persons for counselling in the areas of their career, grief, family life among others. 511 was achieved.

### b) Strategies:

The District continued with the organization of widowhood rites at the Congregational level where surviving spouses, children and family members were prayed for, encouraged and given some gifts.

### c) Way Forward:

The District will continue its encouragement of Agents in the frequent support and engagements of the Widows and Widowers at the Congregational level while the District itself does same. The District will also train the Agents on widowhood rites through Counselling Sessions and in addition expand its guidance and counseling support to identifiable interest groups and needs.

## 6.0 NOTABLE ACHIEVEMENT & EVENTS

### a) 17<sup>th</sup> District Session

The District held her 17<sup>th</sup> District Session on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> and Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> January, 2025 at the Nazareth and Christ the King Congregations for the business meeting and thanksgiving service respectively.

#### *Elections and Appointments:*

The Session elected Cat. Catherine Amaning, Catechist-In-Charge of the Faith Preaching Point also the immediate past Catechists' Rep. on the District Session Council Standing Committee as the new Lay Rep. to the Presbytery Session Council (PSC) for the period 2025 to 2028 following the end of the 4-year tenure of office of the then Lay Rep, Mrs. Eunice Dwamena-Akoto. The District also inducted into office, Cat. Catherine Amaning, the Lay Rep. on 12<sup>th</sup> October, 2025 at the Living Bread Congregation.

Also, Presbyter Mrs. Freda Anson-Lawson, a member of the Mt. of Olives Congregation was elected the Presbyters' Rep. for the year 2025, while Rev. Godfred Amoako Sakyiama, Minister-In-Charge of the Christ the King Congregation was appointed the Ministers' Rep. also for the year 2025.

### b) Handing over of the District Lay Rep

At its Council meeting held on 26<sup>th</sup> March, 2025, a handing over ceremony was

undertaken to officially hand over the mantle of the District Lay Rep to the Presbytery Session Council (PSC).

Mrs. Eunice Dwamnea-Akoto, the outgoing Lay Rep emblematically handed over to Cat. Catherine Amaning, the new Lay Rep. whose tenure of office is from 2025 to 2028. In view of the latter's indisposition and hence, absence, Mrs. Freda Anson-Lawson, the Presbytery's Rep. acted in her stead.

**c) Service of Appreciation for the immediate Past Lay Rep to the PSC**

The District, on Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> July, 2025, held a service of appreciation for the immediate past Lay Rep to the Presbytery Session Council (PSC) Mrs. Eunice Dwamena-Akoto.

The service, which took place at the Salvation Congregation, was to honour her for the selfless and dedicated services rendered during her 4-year tenure of office.

**d) Service Leaders and Bible Readers Seminar / Workshop for Ushers & Committees**

On Friday 31<sup>st</sup> January, 2025, Service Leaders and Bible Readers from all the Congregations and Preaching Points were assembled at the Salvation Congregation for a Seminar on Serving leading and Bible Reading.

The program, which was facilitated by Rev. Martin Obeng was aimed at equipping participants with the skills and essentials for effective worship services to the glory of God.

Participation was very encouraging and it is expected that the lessons learnt will be capitalized on to positively affect the quality of service leading and bible readings in the Church.

Similarly, the Christ the King Congregation organized a workshop for their Ushers as well as an orientation for members of the various committees of the Congregation on 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> January, 2025 respectively.

Also, the Faith Preaching Point held a liturgical and ushering training on 8<sup>th</sup> March, 2025 to further equip their members in these areas.

**e) TRANSFERS, SEND OFFS, INDUCTIONS & INTRODUCTIONS, ORDINATION AND COMMISSIONING SERVICES**

**i) Transfers within the District:**

**h) BSPG and M&E Retreat / Annual Breakfast Meeting**

Two (2) Executive members of the BSPG of the District and the Chairpersons of the Mission and Evangelism Committees of the various Congregations and Preaching Points in the District held a one-day retreat at the Bethel Congregation on Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> March, 2025. Speaking under the theme: ‘Celebrating our Heritage – Discipleship’, the District Minister, Rev. Michael Addoquaye Addo challenged them to prioritize evangelism and do their best to win souls for Christ as we put our shoulders to the wheel and strive to achieve our set targets in the area of evangelism and church growth. He also charged them to invest more energy into the BSPG to revamp it to activate the spirit of church planting, discipleship, bible studies and prayer among others that the group was in some years past known for.

On same day, the District Women’s Fellowship undertook their annual breakfast meeting at same venue.

**i) Update on Faith Preaching Point New Land / Grace Pavilion**

The District Session Council Standing Committee advanced dealings with the new land for the Faith Preaching Point. The Committee, within the period under review, engaged the expertise of a Contractor and Architect (both members of the District) and together are advancing deliberations on the plan for developing the land and structures thereof. In a similar vein, the construction of a Pavilion is underway at the Grace Preaching Point to improve on the place of worship of the Preaching Point.

**j) 16<sup>th</sup> District YAF Conference**

The Salvation Congregation hosted the District YAF for the 16<sup>th</sup> annual delegates Conference which served as a platform for members to meet and deliberate on matters of concern of the group on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> March, 2025 for the business meeting. The Thanksgiving Service will however be held at a later date to make way for the Youth and Students Sunday on 9<sup>th</sup> March, 2025.

**k) Participation in Presbytery Evangelism and Church Growth Consultation**

The District participated in the Presbytery Evangelism and Church Growth Consultation that took place on Friday 28<sup>th</sup> February, 2025 at the Eternity Congregation, Apenkwa under the theme: 'Persisting in Mission: The Heart of the Missionary.' Participants were challenged to pursue the Church's goal of the 1,000 church planting as part of the Agenda 2M move.

Rev. Abraham Opoku Baffour took turn to address the gathering on the sub topic: 'Building a Mission-minded Presbyterian Church of Ghana. He emphasized some biblical basis of mission, areas to consider in mission including ministry to children, students, the aged, afflicted, bereaved, sick, poor and by extension, all persons and as well some modalities including prayer, leadership etc. on sustaining church growth. The District also participated in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Consultation of the Presbytery for the year under review which was held at the Eternity Congregation, Apenkwa from 21<sup>st</sup> to 23<sup>rd</sup> October, 2025.

**l) Launch of Scholarship Scheme**

The Bethel Congregation in the District launched a scholarship scheme on 18<sup>th</sup> January, 2025 to support brilliant but needy students of the Congregation.

**m) Consecration Week / Spiritual Emphasis Month / Prayer into the Month / Revivals**

A one-week fasting and prayer session was observed by the Bethel Congregation from Monday 27<sup>th</sup> to Friday 31<sup>st</sup> January, 2025 with an all-day prayer session on Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> February, 2025 at the Mount Moriah Prayer Center, Danfa. A thanksgiving service was held on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> February, 2025 to crown it all. These were purposed towards the spiritual development of members.

The Faith Preaching Point observed the month of January 2025 as a Spiritual emphasis month with a 21-day fasting and prayer program. About 25 members participated.

At the hope Congregation, a 'Prayer Into The Month' program was held on 28<sup>th</sup> February, 2025 to usher members into the next month with while seeking the face of the Almighty God.

There were revivals to commence the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of the year at the Salvation and Christ the King Congregations from 24<sup>th</sup> to 28<sup>th</sup> February, 2025 held concurrently.

**n) Specialized Ministries:**

**i. Police Cells visitation / Visitation to the Orphanage**

The Grace Preaching Point undertook an outreach to the Pokuase Police Cells on 5<sup>th</sup> January, 2025 where 20 inmates were reached out to with cooked food, soft drinks and water.

Likewise, the Mile 7 Police Station was visited by the Young Adults' Fellowship (YAF) of the Salvation Congregation on 6<sup>th</sup> March, 2025 as part of the YAF week celebrations. 29 inmates and 3 officers on duty were ministered to with the word of God, prayers, cooked and water. Some evangelism tracts were also handed over to the officers.

The group also extended the love of Christ to the Rising Star Orphanage at Dodowa on same day. They donated some toiletries, soft drinks, biscuits, appropriately used clothing, sanitary pads, and other items and encouraged them with the word of God not to be despaired in life giving their present circumstances. The recipients of the outreaches and visitation appreciated the kind gestures done them.

In furtherance of the above, the mother District, led by the Mission and Evangelism Committee, held her usual visitation to Police Cells 26<sup>th</sup> April, 2025. The Taifa Police Station with a total of 9 inmates and 2 officers, the Kwabenya station with 3 inmates with 12 officers and Pokuase Police Stations with 5 inmates with 5 officers were visited with the word of God, cooked food and water.

On 9<sup>th</sup> August, 2025 also, the Mile 7 and Tesano Police Stations were visited. Forty-six (46) inmates and five (5) officers were reached out to with the Salvation message, cooked food, water and prayers. The Team prayed with the inmates as they gave their lives to Christ.

In all, 87 persons made up of 63 inmates and 24 officers were ministered to.

#### ii) **Evangelism Outreaches to Kofi Donkor Preaching Point**

Spearheaded by the Mission and Evangelism Committee and BSPG, the District continued to support and nurture our assigned Kofi Donkor Preaching Point in the Ga West Mission Field. The District was zoned into four (4) for quarterly residential evangelism outreaches at the Preaching Point.

The 1<sup>st</sup> of the 4 zones, undertook the residential outreach from Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> to Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> June, 2025. The outreach was embarked upon by a 17-member team made up of 12 males and 5 females from the Salvation and Gethsemane Congregations and the Grace Preaching Point.

The team testifies of God's intervention in stopping the terrific rains that met them on their arrival after they spoke to God about it.

The District Minister, Rev. Michael Addoquaye Addo was present to pray and share words of motivation and commitment with the team prior to their departure.

As a result of the ban on noise making in that area at the time, the team did a two and half hour house-to-house evangelism from 4pm to 6.30pm reaching out to the young and old. Some weed smokers reached out to gave their lives to Christ. The team fellowshiped with the Preaching Point on the said Sunday with Cat. George Asiedu, Catechist-with-charge of the Salvation Congregation preaching the sermon. Attendance was 16 Adults and 45 Children.

Two (2) souls were won and joined the Church on the Sunday whiles four (4) young ladies who had stopped going to Church as a result of the house-to-house outreach, went with the promise to continue going to Church.

The Zone presented six (6) N.I.V Bibles, some appropriately used clothes, biscuits and drinks to the church. A member of the zone who could not join the team donated Ghc500.00 which was also presented to the Preaching Point.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> zone outlined for the outreach duly took place on 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> June, 2025 with the Bethel, Hope and Living Bread Congregations attending. 7 souls were won for Christ. A Junior Youth (JY) Service was started for the Preaching Point with 10 youth. The 3<sup>rd</sup> zone, made up of Calvary and Mt. of Olives Congregations as well as Faith Preaching Point embarked on the outreach. 1 soul from a nearby community named Tswakai was won for the Kofi Donkor Preaching Point.

It is worth mentioning that the Chief there received the team well to the glory of God.

The residential outreaches were marked with evangelism activities including house-to-house, dawn broadcast etc. on the 1<sup>st</sup> days and a joint service with the Kofi Donkor Preaching Point on the 2<sup>nd</sup> days of the outreaches.

The Teams were led by the Chairperson of the Mission and Evangelism Committee of the District, Mr. Emmanuel Andzie-Quainoo.

Zone 4, made up of Christ the King, Mt. Zion and Nazareth was however, rescheduled to undertake their outreach from 19<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> December, 2025 at Ahiabu, a suburb in the Adjen-Kotoku Sub-District as part of the District's surveillance of the area for the Church Planting requirements of the Head Office.

It is our prayer that the God will Himself water the seeds planted to win more souls for Him.

**o) Operation one member one soul**

The exercise was undertaken by the Faith Preaching Point where the last Sunday of February 2025 was used for a 'family and friends service'. Four (4) persons visited the church with two (2) joining to the glory of God.

**p) Evangelism Retreat**

The Salvation Congregation held a retreat on evangelism for members of the evangelism committee and other interested persons on Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> March, 2025 and charged participants to give themselves to the spread of the gospel to bring the lost souls to Christ Jesus. The program was facilitated by the District Minister / Minister-In-Charge Rev. Michael Addoquaye Addo and the Associate Minister Rev. Gideon Ransford Boafa.

**q) Harvest Launch**

The 2025 harvest have been launched in some Congregations and Preaching Points. It took place on 2<sup>nd</sup> March, 2025 at the Salvation, Christ the King and Bethel Congregations.

**r) Session Retreat**

The Session of the Salvation Congregation, held a 2-day retreat at the Mount Moriah Prayer Center, Danfa on Friday 7<sup>th</sup> and Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> February, 2025 with the Director of the Center Rev. Daniel Ayim as well as Rev. Dr. Kofi Amfo Akunnor (Sakaman District Minister / President of the National Ministers' Conference) and the District Minister / Minister-In-Charge of the Congregation Rev. Michael Addoquaye Addo as the Resource Persons. **u) 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration of the Salvation Singing Band**

Within the period under review, the Salvation Singing Band celebrated their 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary under the theme: ‘Celebrating our Heritage, Persisting in Mission Through Music (1 Cor. 15:58, Psalm 09:1-3).

The celebration was launched on 2<sup>nd</sup> February, 2025. It was marked with a number of activities and climaxed with a thanksgiving service on 30<sup>th</sup> March, 2025. The activities included: Visitations to Aged Congregants which took place on 27<sup>th</sup> February, Street Preaching and Singing (From 3<sup>rd</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup> March, 2025), Live Song Ministrations at Oman FM and Atinka TV on 5<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> March respectively. The group also held a music festival with other singing groups both within and outside the Congregation. This took place on 22<sup>nd</sup> March, 2025. Rev. (Rtd) Emmanuel Darko of the P.C.G. The District held a training for leaders specifically for Agents, Group leaders as well as other interested persons. The program took place on Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> May, 2025 at the Salvation Congregation. It was under the Theme: 'Leading like Jesus, -a Call to transformational Church Leadership' aimed at building the capacity of Christian leaders for positive impact in the Church of Christ.

The training covered areas on 'understanding the biblical concept of leadership, the examining of Jesus' style of leadership and as well discussions on the way forward.

The program was facilitated by Mr. Stephen Bani Kwakye, the immediate past District Session Clerk of the Abeka District also a Ministerial Student of the Special Ministerial Training (SMT), Abetifi. **kk) Students of Lancaster University Ghana donate to the New Achimota Presby Basic School**

As part of their Foundation Program of their Level 100 studies, some students of the Lancaster University Ghana located at Tantra Hills in Accra, on Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> June, 2025, paid a visit to the New Achimota Presby Basic School (NAPBS).

The students donated items including 3 Veronica buckets and their corresponding basin bowls, two 750g dustbins, some detergents and toiletries.

The items also included some Stationary as follows: 200 Exercise books, 150 Pens, 12 packets of Pencils, 2 packs of erasers, 24 mathematical sets and a box of White board marker. The kind gesture was part of a Community Outreach Project of the Students.

They were taken through practical examination approaches to the English, Mathematics and Social Studies by External Examiners.

**oo) Commissioning / Orientation of Newly-Elected Presbyters**

Fifteen (15) Newly-Elected Presbyters (made up of 8 males and 7 females) of the Christ the King Congregation, were on Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> July, 2025, commissioned into office.

The new Senior Presbyter, Mrs. Barbara Serwah Ankobia who replaced Mrs. Rebecca Collison, in addressing the gathering on behalf of the team, affirmed their complete acceptance of the mandate and the assurance to build on the foundation laid by their predecessors whiles expressing their appreciation to the Past Presbyters for their invaluable services.

Preaching the sermon for the day on the theme 'Called to Serve' , the Minister-In-Charge of the Congregation, also the Ga West Presbytery CLAN Director, Rev. Godfred Amoako Sakyiama admonished the Presbyters with an anchor text from 1 Peter 4:10-11.

The service was led by Cat. Samuel Adomako Boadu Antwi, Catechist-In-Charge of the Congregation. It was also graced with the presence of the District Session Clerk, Ms. Nora Narh Oyorley, Congregants, family members, friends and loved ones. Prior to this, a two-day orientation seminar was organized for the newly elected Presbyters. The program was facilitated by Rev. Dr. G. O. Kwapong, the then Kaneshie District Minister.

**pp) Prayer Convention**

The District held the 4<sup>th</sup> edition of her annual Prayer Convention from Monday 21<sup>st</sup> to Friday 25<sup>th</sup> July, 2025 at the Salvation Congregation. The 5-day session was power-packed and lead by Evang. Emmanuel Kwadwo Darko. It was a period of solid deliverance and encounter with God Almighty. This was the 1<sup>st</sup> 'Open-Air Session' of the Convention as it was held outside the Auditorium. To the glory of God, participation and the objectives of the program were highly met beyond our imagination.

**qq) Salvation Congregation Men's Fellowship donates Sign Boards to Kofi Donkor**

The Men's Fellowship of the Salvation Congregation donated four (4) sign boards to the Kofi Donkor Preaching Point in the Ga West Mission Field on 29<sup>th</sup> July, 2025.

The kind gesture follows series of steps taken by the mother District (such as Evangelism outreaches, donation of church enhancement items, joint worship services among others).

**rr) Launch Of Salvation Congregation's 50th Anniversary Celebration**

The Salvation Congregation, on Sunday 3rd August, 2025 launched it's 50th Anniversary to commence the year-long activities for the celebration. The Anniversary is under the theme: '50 Years of God's Faithfulness: Anchored in Grace, Advancing with Purpose'

Tagline: 'Grounded in Hope, Growing in Evangelism' Hebrews 6:13–20.

Various Paraphernalia for the anniversary were outdoored on the day. The launch was proceeded by media engagements in July 2025 on Peace and Oman FMs with the Co-Chairpersons, Rev. The program was facilitated by Mr. Francis Opare Aniagyei, Headmaster of O'Reilly SHS also a committee member with support by the Chairperson of the Committee, Rev. Rosemond Maku Gardiner-Korli. There was also a time for prayers with the participants.






