1.0 INTRODUCTION

This report covers the activities of the Sakaman District for the year 2025. It focuses on Organization and Staffing, Overarching Goals, Departmental Goals, Notable Achievements and Events, Major Challenges, and Emerging / New Strategic Focus, in line with the 2020–2029 Strategic Plan of the Presbyterian Church of Ghana.

2.0 ORGANIZATION AND STAFFING

2(a) CONGREGATIONS

The District continues to have six (6) Congregations and one (2) Preaching Points, namely:

1. Ramseyer Congregation
2. Calvary Congregation
3. Bethel Congregation
4. Grace Congregation
5. Trinity Congregation
6. Blessed Congregation
7. Adaman Preaching Point
8. Krokohwe Preaching Point

2(b)(1) OFFICERS OF THE DISTRICT

3.0 OVERARCHING GOALS

(a) Membership Statistics

OG-01: The membership of the District increased from 3,205 in 2024 to 3,452 in 2025, representing a growth rate of 11.9% exceeding the annual 10% annual growth target.

(b) Meeting Reporting Deadlines

OG-02 – OG-04: The District successfully submitted all statutory reports within the stipulated timelines, including the District TYRP, Quarterly Reports and the Annual Report.

OG-05: Appraisal and performance target setting for Agents-in-Charge were duly carried out by 31st January 2025.

4.0 DEPARTMENTAL GOALS

4.1 MISSION AND EVANGELISM

(a) Key Performance Indicators

- **ME-01:** The District won a total of three hundred and eighty-one (381) souls through evangelism activities at the Congregational level and also due to the establishment of a new Preaching Point at Krokohwe.
- **ME-02:** A total of eight (8) mission activities were undertaken during the year.
- **Discipleship:** Eighteen (18) persons completed discipleship classes for new converts and members.

(b) Strategies

- Various evangelism approaches were adopted by Congregations, including personal evangelism and group outreach activities.
- The various strategies used included house to house evangelism, street evangelism, visitation to Nsawam Prison, Mission to Banks (UMB) and Campus Ministry.
- The District BSPG members assisted some congregations to do monthly house to house evangelism on rotational basis.
- The church planting activity at Krokohwe
- Visitation to Odorkor Police Cells.

Way Forward

- Evangelism efforts will be intensified in the ensuing year.

- Congregations will be encouraged to strengthen follow-up mechanisms for new converts.
- All groups will be urged to actively participate in soul winning.
- Establishment of the second Preaching Point at Adjen Kotoku

4.2 ADMINISTRATION AND HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

(a) Key Performance Indicators

- **AHRM-01 – AHRM-02:** The Agents in the District attended various training workshop. Training for Session Clerks, Implementation Coordinators on report writing and preparation of the Strategic Plan came off once every quarter with the exception of the last quarter of 2025. The Agents, Senior Presbyters, Session Clerks and Implementation Coordinators attend some training sessions organised by the Ga West Presbytery, both online and in person.
- **AHRM-03:** All Congregations updated their membership data, completed their Form C and forwarded same to the District Office every quarter.
- **AHRM-04:** Not all congregations use the ERP. Some Congregations collect the membership data by using the Roll Book and other software.
- **AHRM-05:** Two (2) landed properties belonging to the District and Congregations were successfully registered during the year under review. This represents an improvement in land documentation within the District.
- **AHRM-06:** Four (4) landed properties and their contents were insured, exceeding the target of three (3). Three (3) of the insured properties were insured through TIB as brokers. This reflects increased awareness of the need to protect church properties.
- No land was acquired for Preaching Points during the year, and no chapels were constructed.

(b) Strategies

In-service training remained the main capacity-building strategy.

(c) Way Forward

- Regular training sessions on the new Three-Year Rolling Plan (TYRP) will be organized quarterly.
- The District will continue to encourage Congregations to regularize documentation on their landed properties.
- Efforts will be intensified to acquire land for the Adaman and Krokohwe Preaching Points.

4.3 ECUMENICAL AND SOCIAL RELATIONS

(a) Key Performance Indicators:

- **ESR-01:** One (1) public interest activity was organized during the year, with a total participation of two hundred and six (206) persons.

In collaboration with DSS and Mission & Evangelism, 2025 Emmaus Day was organized as a District with activities such as aerobics, talk on Diabetes, healthy eating and personal hygiene.

- **ESR-02:** The District participated in two (2) Local Council of Churches (LCC) programmes, with twelve (12) persons representing the District at the congregational level
- **ESR-03:** No activity was organized during the year in relation to ministry to people of other faiths.
- **ESR-04:** One (1) activity was organized to promote healthy relationship and ministry to the palace, with ten (10) persons participating. This was when Ramseyer Congregation visited the Sakaman Chief's Palace with the Chief and his entourage worshipping with the congregation in March 2025.

(b) Strategies:

- Congregations were encouraged to participate in ecumenical activities organized by the Local Council of Churches.
- Representatives of the District were encouraged to attend inter-church and community-based programmes.
- On Emmaus Day, all congregations in the District convened at the Radiantway School park to celebrate the day.

(c) Way Forward:

- The District will intensify participation in ecumenical and inter-faith activities.
- More public interest programmes will be organized to enhance the visibility of the Church in the community

4.4 DEVELOPMENT AND SOCIAL SERVICES

(a) Key Performance Indicators:

- **DSS-01:** Five (5) healthy living, sanitation and environmental care activities were organized during the year. A total of eight hundred and forty-seven (847) persons participated in these activities, exceeding the target. This included free health screening at some congregations and preaching points where the entire community participated in.
- **DSS-02:** No livelihood development support was provided for persons with disability during the year.
- **DSS-03:** Five (5) entrepreneurial development activities were organized, benefiting ninety-six (96) participants. Various youth members learnt beadmaking and soapmaking.
- **DSS-03B:** The annual Christmas Street Party was organized, during which one thousand, two hundred and ninety-two (1292) persons mostly on the street were fed. All six (6) congregations and two (2) preaching points participated in this wonderful initiative.
- **DSS-04 – DSS-06:** General welfare needs such as visitation, funerals, marriages and naming ceremonies were supported. Seventy (70) members in different congregations

benefited, with a total expenditure of **GHC58,182.00**. Each Congregation has a welfare policy and attended to the specific welfare needs of the congregants in cash and in kind.

(b) Strategies:

- The Committee continued to collaborate with Congregations to identify vulnerable members.
- Social intervention activities were used as a tool for community engagement.
- Every congregation had a plan on invalid visitation. Invalid members were given monthly Communion and monthly allowances. Emotional and financial support were also provided to extremely distressed members.

(c) Way Forward:

- Livelihood and entrepreneurial development programmes will be intensified.
- Greater attention will be given to supporting persons with disabilities.
- All Sessions are encouraged to promptly attend to the welfare of their members.

4.5 FINANCE

a) **Key Performance Indicators:**

- **Fin-01:** The 2024 audited financial statement of the congregations and that of the District were prepared and submitted to the District Office.
- **Fin-02:** Expenditure on Evangelism, welfare, Education and scholarship was assured.
- **Fin-03:** Congregations transferred their weekly 52/48 proceeds and all other Almanac proceeds to the District.

b) **Strategies:**

Congregations were encouraged to transfer the Sunday proceeds to the District latest by Wednesday of every week. They were asked to take a picture of their completed slips on Sundays after service to the District Treasurer.

4.6 EDUCATION

(a) Key Performance Indicators:

- **Edu-01:** Candidates performed very well in the BECE. However, the district does not have any schools under it currently.

- **Edu-02:** Schools in the church community were visited during their worship services. A total of Six hundred and thirty-seven (637) students were reached in collaboration with the Mission and Evangelism Committee.
- **Edu-03:** Speaking and reading of Ghanaian Languages was promoted in some congregations.
- **Edu-04:** We could not visit NUPS-G Wesley Grammar over the period under review.
- **Edu-05:** Thirty (30) students in Senior High Schools and tertiary institutions were visited.
- **Edu-06:** One hundred and sixty (160) young members were mentored, exceeding the target of ninety-one.
- **Edu-07:** Three (3) students received scholarship support with one coming from the newly established Krokohwe Preaching Point.

(b) Strategies:

Congregational Sessions were encouraged to support their students in Senior High Schools and tertiary institutions.

(c) Way Forward:

Congregations are encouraged to organize regular visitation to their members in educational institutions.

4.7 CHURCH LIFE AND NURTURE

(a) Key Performance Indicators:

- **CLN-01:** Average attendance to Church Services increased to one thousand and sixteen (1,016) from nine hundred (900) in 2024, representing a growth rate of **12.9%**.
- **CLN-02:** Attendance at Generational Group meetings recorded an average of three hundred and two (302) as compared to two hundred and ninety (290) in 2024.
- **CLN-03:** One hundred and fifty-five (155) members participated in soul-winning and discipleship activities through the Christ Ambassadors Programme which led to the establishment of the Krokohwe Preaching Point.
- **CLN-04:** Training programmes for Presbyters, Committee Members and Group Executives recorded **two hundred and forty-two (242) person-days** of training. This was mainly due to the flagship seven (7) week intensive presbyters' training where sixty-five (65) presbyters graduated successfully.
- **CLN-05:** Four (4) guidance and counselling programmes were organized, with seventy-five (75) persons participating in the various congregations.
- **CLN-06:** Six (6) persons received counselling services for various needs including career, grief and family life in the various congregations

Counselling services and prayers were offered to individuals who required support, and guidance programmes were organized for identifiable groups.

(b) Strategies:

- Various training programmes were organized at both District and Congregational levels, including leadership development and capacity-building activities.
- Presbyters' Training Programme

(c) Way Forward:

- More training programmes will be organized in the coming year to equip members for effective service.
- There will be more counselling services for members in the ensuing year. Congregations are encouraged to sponsor members for counselling training to increase the number of trained counsellors in the Church.

5.0 NOTABLE EVENTS

5.1 MISSION & EVANGELISM

(a) District Prayer Gathering

The quarterly District Prayer Gathering was held every quarter with the exception of the last quarter. Average attendance to the programme was 63 and was always held at Ramseyer Congregation. It was a time for members to pray for their lives, families, and the nation. The gathering was always spiritually uplifting and reinforced the call for personal renewal.

(b) Prison and Cell Ministry

The District continued its weekly Prison Ministry at Nsawam, sharing the Word of God with inmates. As at September 2025, a total of 109 souls had been reached. Blessed Congregation also carried out a special visitation to the Odorkor Police Cells, where inmates were encouraged through the Word of God and supported with donated essential items.

(c) Christ Ambassadors Training and Evangelism

In line with the District's mandate to establish new preaching points, a Christ Ambassadors Training was organized from 30th July to 1st August 2025 at Ramseyer Congregation. About 40 members drawn from various congregations participated. The programme was coordinated by the District Mission and Evangelism Committee and facilitated by Catechist Osei Buabeng.

Following the training, the Christ Ambassadors embarked on seven (7) weeks of house-to-house evangelism in the Krokorhwe community, through which 303 souls were reached.

(d) Establishment of Krokorhwe Preaching Point

The District successfully established the Krokorhwe Preaching Point. Preparatory activities included:

- Film Show on 12th September 2025
- Street Worship on 13th September 2025

The inaugural service was held on Sunday, 14th September 2025 at the Krokorhwe School Park, and was graced by the District Minister, members of the District Council, and representatives of churches in the community.

At the inaugural service, 12 adults and 122 children became foundation members of the Preaching Point. In his sermon on Repentance, the District Minister encouraged members to rejoice whenever even one soul turns to Christ.

Special appreciation was extended to the Mission and Evangelism Team led by Mr. Mawuli Kofi Mawuli, and to the Christ Ambassadors.

Mr. Isaac Asuah of Calvary Congregation was appointed Caretaker, supported by a five-member Interim Management Committee (IMC).

5.2 ADMINISTRATION & HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

The District AHRM Committee commenced systematic visitation to congregations to:

- Inspect statutory books
- Ensure proper record keeping
- Engage lay staff to listen to their challenges

The exercise was successful and all congregations that lacked the statutory books were encouraged to purchase them for effective administration across the District.

5.3 ECUMENICAL AND SOCIAL RELATIONS

- The District participated actively in the Ga West Presbytery 10th Anniversary Walk, from Sakaman Junction to Emmanuel Congregation, Dansoman, demonstrating unity, fellowship, and joy among congregations.
- The District ESR organised the 2025 Emmaus Day with activities such as aerobics, inter-congregation quiz based on the Passion Week and Easter stories, football, volley ball, tug of peace, table tennis, draught and musical chairs. It was an interesting programme

5.3 CHURCH LIFE AND NURTURE

- The **District JY Quiz** was held on **9th August 2025** at **Ramseyer Congregation**.
- The **Children's Service Quiz** took place on **16th August 2025** at **Calvary Congregation**, with **Blessed Congregation** placing **1st** and **Trinity Congregation** placing **2nd**.
- **YPG Spiritual Emphasis Month** - From **July to August 2025**, the YPG observed a Spiritual Emphasis Month involving daily prayers and fasting. The programme climaxed with a revival service in the first week of August, reigniting spiritual passion among the youth.
- The Women's Fellowship elected new leaders on 25th October 2025

- The District Choir elected new leaders during their annual conference

5.4 DEVELOPMENT AND SOCIAL SERVICES

Ramseyer Congregation organized a Market Outreach programme dubbed “Maranatha, Our Lord Cometh” on 30th August 2025. The outreach included free health screening for over four hundred (400) people, free provision of medication, as well as evangelism through preaching and the distribution of tracts, which resulted in forty (40) souls being won for Christ.

In addition, the Young Adults’ Fellowship of the Congregation visited the Krokohwe Preaching Point as part of its “12 Days to Christmas Programme.” During the visit, the Fellowship fed over three hundred (300) people and also provided free health screening for members of the community.

5.5 DISTRICT COVENANT SERVICE

A Covenant Service was held for all Agents and Leaders in the District on Friday January 01, 2025 at Ramseyer Congregation. The Sermon was delivered by the District Minister, Rev. Dr. Kofi Amfo-Akonnor. He led members to renew their vows to God after the Holy Communion.

5.6 DISTRICT NEW YEAR’S SCHOOL

The maiden New Year School was held on 31st January 2025 at Ramseyer Congregation. The District Minister, Rev. Dr. Kofi Amfo Akonnor, was the main speaker and enlightened members on the resilience and hard work of the early missionaries, highlighting lessons for contemporary Christian service. The programme was well-organized and spiritually enriching.

5.7 SEND-OFF SERVICE FOR OUTGOING DISTRICT CLERK

On 16th March 2025, the first Clerk of the Sakaman District, Madam Selasie Wemakor, who had faithfully served two full tenures, was given a colourful send-off ceremony at her home congregation, Trinity Congregation, Chabaa. In attendance were members of the District Session Council Standing Committee. She was commended and thanked for her dedicated service to the District and for laying a solid foundation for the incoming Clerk.

5.8 INDUCTION OF INCOMING DISTRICT SESSION CLERK

On Sunday, 6th April 2025, the newly elected District Session Clerk, Mr. Kwaku Yiadom Agyare, was commissioned into office during the Forenoon Divine Service at Ramseyer Congregation. He was formally charged to build upon the solid foundation laid by the immediate past Clerk and to serve the District with diligence, integrity, and commitment.

5.9 PRESBYTERS’ TRAINING AND GRADUATION

A major highlight of the year was the **Graduation of 65 Presbyters on 23rd August 2025** at the Ramseyer Congregation. These presbyters had undergone a 7-week intensive training programme under the CLAN Committee.

The District Minister, Rev. Dr. Kofi Amfo-Akonnor, in his address, outlined the seven manuals used for the training and encouraged other District Ministers to organize similar programmes. The event was graced by dignitaries including:

- **Rev. Dr. Yaw Boadu**, Head of Programmes at the Ramseyer Training Centre,
- **Rev. Andrew Shardow**, National CLAN Director, representing the Moderator,
- **Rev. Dr. Samuel Nortey Adjei**, District Minister of Weija Gbawe, representing the Ga West Chairperson.

The colourful event was attended by catechists, presbyters, family, friends, and members of the District. It was both a celebration of achievement and a renewal of commitment to service in God’s vineyard.
